Letter from the Association President

What a great year! Once again we had a very successful Trees & Traditions fundraiser, generating \$32,605 in income! These funds support the Museum Association's free educational programming and temporary exhibitions for the community.

Our success was due mainly to three factors: our members and guests, who turned out in large numbers to enjoy the festive event, which included a surprise performance by young ballerinas from Transitions Dance; our community supporters, who provided sponsorship funds and in-kind donations; and our hard-working Sutter County Museum Association members, who devoted many hours over the course of the year to the variety of tasks required to host a successful party. Thank you to all who contributed!

Once again we've had significant changes in staffing. Our beloved Assistant Curator, Drisel Perez, left the Museum for a new opportunity near the end of the fiscal year. And unfortunately, due to the County budget, we are unable to fill her position, leaving us with a large gap in Museum staffing. As you've undoubtedly heard by now, the Museum is coping with this shortage by reducing public hours and offering fewer services.

In addition, Marika Garcia, our Development Officer, left for another opportunity and was replaced by Narinder Sufi, who is showing her chops as a seasoned government and nonprofit funding professional.

Fortunately for us, both Marika and our former Assistant Curator, Sharyl Simmons, have joined the Association! So we are continuing to benefit from their experience and expertise.

Last summer we reveled in the excitement generated by the temporary hands-on children's exhibit, Potter the Otter, which brought over 3,100 children and families to the Museum in under two months. Watch for another child-focused exhibit next summer.

The Association provided substantial funding for the Black History of Yuba-Sutter exhibit, including a donation toward commissioning Louie Lethridge to paint original artworks on the two exhibit cases. Please come by the Museum to see Louie's extraordinary talent on display.

Because of a generous sponsorship from the Harkey House and the hard work of staff and volunteers, we redesigned and republished the Sutter County Scenic Driving Tour guidebook, which is for sale in the Museum's Gift Shop.

We also made some facility upgrades. We added to our sound system to improve public programs like our Speaker Series, Kids' Movie Nights, and Trees & Traditions. Thanks to a sponsorship from Sutter County Children & Families Commission, we added changing tables in both restrooms to make the Museum more family-friendly. And because of a grant subsidy, we were able to purchase an automated external defibrillator (AED) to improve visitor safety.

Looking forward, 2025 is the Musem's 50th anniversary! Association members are hard at work preparing to celebrate our achievements next spring.

Despite some new challenges, we are confident that our group of enthusiastic, productive, and inspired Association volunteers will continue to provide a superb experience for Museum visitors and our local

Letter from the Museum Director

We had another great year at the Sutter County Museum! From July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024 (FY23-24) we experienced steady growth in visitation; offered six temporary exhibits that brought in diverse and engaging topics; hosted over 125 educational programs, field trips, and group visits; and saw a 70% increase in grade school trips and group outings to the Museum.

The Sutter County Museum is a partnership between Sutter County and the Sutter County Museum Association, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. Each provides substantial funding to support the Museum and our operations. Due to the Sutter County budget, the County has been forced to scale back services across its departments, including the Museum. As a result, we are severely affected by the decrease with our professional museum staff positions going from 2.5 full-time employees to 1.5 full-time employees. This has a significant impact on our capacity to provide services to the community and operate the Museum. We expect this upcoming year to be challenging and know that success will be measured differently.

Despite these challenges, we are strongly committed to using available resources to continue bringing free engaging exhibits and free educational programs to the Yuba-Sutter community and beyond. Funds raised by memberships, donations, purchases in the Gift Shop, and at fundraising events like Trees & Traditions support the Sutter County Museum Association. Our hardworking Museum Association members have many exciting events and programs planned already! Before the end of 2024, you can expect to see announcements for the opening of the Black History of Yuba-Sutter permanent exhibit, funded by a grant from California Humanities. By April of 2025, in time for the Sutter County Museum's 50th anniversary, we are scheduled to open our new comprehensive flood exhibit, redesigned Nisenan exhibit, and exhibit for visitors to explore themes of the Gold Rush and Westward Expansion. Thanks to a \$383,183 multi-year award from the California Natural Resources Agency's Museum Grant Program, we can implement new family-friendly upgrades to these exhibit areas. And we are working to bring back another hands-on children's exhibit in summer of 2025 in partnership with the Sutter County Children & Families Commission.

We are so appreciative for the many ways that people generously support the Museum and continue to help us grow and continue the meaningful work that the Museum can do for the community. Whether you contributed financially, supported us through an annual membership, donated your time, offered in-kind goods or services, or partnered to offer events and exhibits, we thank you. Your support makes it possible to continue providing free and impactful educational opportunities to the Yuba-Sutter community.

Thank you, and we look forward to another wonderful year at the Museum!

Community Impacts and Year at a Glance

The Museum accomplished a lot this past year! Several projects and upgrades were completed to support the Museum, and many ongoing projects continued. A handful of important highlights from the past year include:

Gwen Ford, our humanities and exhibit advisor for the Black History of Yuba-Sutter project, accepted a proclamation from the Sutter County Board of Supervisors to highlight Black history in the community.



64 volunteers contributed **3,332** hours to support the Sutter County Museum.

Offered over **125** educational public programs, field trips, and group visits, a **35%** increase from the previous year. These programs brought nearly 4,000 people to the Sutter County Museum.

8,712 people visited the Sutter County Museum, a **6%** increase from the previous year.

Ettl Hall was used for **166** days, or **45%** of the year. **43** different renters from the public and 12 County Departments utilized Ettl Hall for events, meetings, and programs.

Over **700** youth visited the Museum for educational field trips and group visits this past school year.

> Trees & Traditions had a record year of fundraising with \$32,605 in income to support the next year of free exhibits and educational programming.

The community voted the Sutter County Museum the Appeal-Democrat's Best Museum/Art Gallery of Yuba-Sutter-Colusa 2023.

Began offering postcards of artworks in the Main Gallery as a fundraiser to bring income for commissioning additional original artworks by local artists. Fundraising from these postcards, Trees & Traditions, and Patio Pavers increased by 21% this year.

Hosted **6** temporary exhibits on diverse topics. Exhibits were developed in collaboration with community partners, and several featured local artifacts from the Museum collection.





Narinder Sufi started as the **Development** Officer for the Museum and Sutter County Library to manage our fundraising and membership efforts to continue bringing dynamic and educational services to the community.

During Potter the Otter: A Healthy Adventure, **3,128** children and adults visited the Museum, donations and Gift Shop sales increased, the Museum's Facebook page received over **1,000** new "likes," and dozens of people signed up for our monthly eNewsletter.

Supported local high school and college students with **3** paid seasonal internships to conduct research for the upcoming Black History of Yuba-Sutter exhibit, sponsored by California Humanities, and made significant progress to open the permanent exhibition later in 2024.

Began the exhibit design phase with Ralph Appelbaum Associates and Gizmo Art Production for the initial phases of developing a new permanent flood exhibit and upgrades to the Museum's exhibit areas on the Nisenan and Gold Rush. This multi-year project is supported by a grant award of \$383,183 from the California Natural Resources Agency.





Upgraded the sound system in the Museum and Ettl Hall to improve public programs like Speaker Series and Kids' Movie Nights.

Added changing tables to the restrooms to make the Museum more family-friendly with support from a Sutter County Children & Families Commission sponsorship.

Thanks to a grant subsidy, purchased an AED (automated external defibrillator) to improve **VISITOR** safety.

Provided substantial funding for the Black History of Yuba-Sutter exhibit, including support to commission local artist Louie Lethridge to paint original artworks on exhibit cases.

Published an updated Sutter County Scenic Driving Tour guidebook, now available in the Museum's Gift Shop, thanks to a sponsorship from Harkey House.

Daisy Beltran began a new role at the Museum as a part-time Office Assistant to provide substantial administrative and guest service support for the operation of Ettl Hall and the Museum.



Educational Public Programs, Field Trips, and Group Visits

In FY23-24, we provided over **125** educational public programs, field trips, and group visits, a 35% increase from the previous year. These programs brought nearly 4,000 people to the Sutter County Museum.

Temporary Exhibits

We host four to six temporary exhibits each year that offer opportunities to appeal to new and diverse audiences in the community. The goals of temporary exhibits are to highlight the local history of the region, expand on topics already covered in our permanent exhibits, bring in new or contemporary topics, and/or help locate the history of this area in the broader context of California or U.S. history. These exhibits are rented traveling exhibitions, developed out of our collection of local history objects and photographs, or collaborations with guest curators or partner organizations.



Potter the Otter: A Healthy Adventure June 10 - July 30, 2023

Based on the popular children's book series Potter the Otter, published by First 5 Santa Clara County, this hands-on, interactive exhibit was developed especially for kids 5 and under and their families. Visitors explored at the market, cooked in the play kitchen, enjoyed goose races, and played in the crawlers' garden in this interactive, STEAM-based experience. Thanks to local support from the Sutter County Children & Families Commission, kids played and learned on their very own healthy adventures!



The 2024 Sutter Buttes Calendar Exhibit August 4 - August 24, 2023

Her Side of the Story: Tales of California Pioneer Women January 16 - April 27, 2024

Illuminating the hardships, joys, and lives of female pioneers, this exhibit featured 30 first-person accounts collected from women who traveled by land or sea to settle throughout California prior to 1854. These personal memories, quotes, and photographs were showcased along with local objects from the Sutter County Museum collection representing the area's pioneers.



Transitions: Art of the Sutter Health Children's Bereavement Group May 7 - June 9, 2024

Death is an inevitable part of life that is a difficult journey to experience. The Sutter Health Children's Bereavement Group is a free community support group that is specially designed for children and teens to self-reflect and identify with peers who can support their journeys. This special exhibit featured art created by over 40 students participating in the free community support groups.



Away From Home: American Indian **Boarding School Stories** June 18 - August 10, 2024

This exhibit examined an important and often unknown period of American history. Beginning in the 1870s and up until the 1930s, the U.S. government attempted to educate and assimilate American Indians into "civilized" society by placing children - of all ages, and from hundreds of diverse cultures - in distant boarding schools. Many were forcibly taken from their families and stripped of their cultures. Children often went years without family contact, and these events still have a lasting impact on Native communities today. This exhibition explored offreservation boarding schools through a variety of voices with photographs, interviews, and objects.


Financial Statement


The Sutter County Museum is a department of Sutter County with our own department budget. This includes employee salaries and benefits, utilities, building and grounds maintenance, insurance, and basic business expenses. Museum staff also operate Ettl Hall, a rental facility with a separate budget unit. Earned revenues from rental fees offset the costs for the upkeep of the space, such as building and equipment maintenance, utilities, and insurance.

The 501(c)(3) nonprofit Museum Association also supports the Museum financially. This budget covers the costs for temporary and permanent exhibits, educational programs, public events, school and group tours, marketing, Gift Shop merchandise and operation, the Artisan Community Garden, and more.

This year, both Sutter County and the Museum Association invested in upgrades to significantly enhance the facilities. The County replaced the floors in Ettl Hall with high-quality flooring to support rental operations. The Museum Association upgraded the sound system in the Museum as well as Ettl Hall to improve audio components for lectures, movie nights, and other public programs. We purchased an AED with a grant subsidy to make the Museum safer for visitors. Thanks to a generous sponsorship from Sutter County Children & Families Commission, we added changing tables to the restrooms within the Museum to make the space more family-friendly to better support our youngest visitors.




